Science

Task: Identify the different parts of your egg. Draw a picture, label and explain each part.

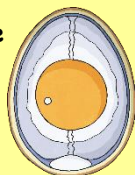
Clue = there are 6 altogether!

Catherine of Aragon - Wife 1

Henry's first wife was Spanish, called Catherine of Aragon. (Aragon was a region of Spain). They were married for nearly 24 years. At their marriage in 1509, Henry was 18 and Catherine 24. They had six children but only one survived, a girl called Mary. Henry needed a son and heir but it just didn't happen. Catherine eventually grew too old to have another baby and around the same time, Henry fell in love with Anne Boleyn.

Henry wanted to divorce Catherine so he could marry Anne, but he was Catholic and at that time, Catholics were not allowed to divorce without a really good reason.

Henry tried to think of a reason. Catherine had been married to his older brother, Arthur, before him. (Arthur died in 1501). Henry tried to say that the Bible forbids you to marry your brother's wife, even if your brother is dead. But the Pope wasn't having any of this, so Henry broke away from the Catholic church and declared himself Head of the Church of England. As he was in charge, he could get the divorce he wanted!

The divorce went through in 1533. Poor old Catherine of Aragon was sent to a convent, and died broken-hearted in 1536 still unable to believe what had happened. She is buried in Peterborough Cathedral.

Anne Boleyn - Wife 2

Anne Boleyn was a flirtatious young lady. She grew up at court in France and was very fashionable, bright and entertaining. She wanted to be Queen of England and nothing would stop her. Henry fell head-over-heels in love with her.

After Henry divorced Catherine of Aragon he married Anne Boleyn in secret, then they had a second wedding ceremony in 1533. They were happy for a few months, but she too failed to have a son, just a daughter - Elizabeth. Henry soon grew bored and his advisor Thomas Cranwell began to plot against Anne...

Although there was very little evidence, Henry decided Anne Boleyn was a witch, and had enchanted him into marrying her. He locked her up in the Tower of London and then had her beheaded. He did show her one last kindness, if you can call it that: he hired a special executioner from France who would chop her head off fast and (fairly) painlessly. All in all they were married less than 3 years.

Jane Seymour - Wife 3

Jane Seymour is meant to have been the one wife that Henry truly loved. They married in 1536 just 11 days after he beheaded Anne Boleyn. She finally gave him the son he wanted, Edward, a year later. Unfortunately having a baby was a dangerous business in those days and she died only 12 days later aged 29.

She was the only wife to get a proper Queen's burial and Henry himself was buried lying next to her, which is another reason people think he loved her best.

Anne of Cleves - Wife 4

This was an unfortunate marriage, although it ended quite well compared to some of Henry's wives! Anne was a German princess and Henry had only seen paintings of her before their wedding. Unfortunately when they met in person, neither found the other attractive... at all!

Henry quickly managed to find a reason to divorce her (that she was engaged to a French duke and therefore not free to marry him). Because she didn't complain about the divorce, he gave her a lot of land and money including Hever Castle (which he had snatched from Anne Boleyn's family). They were only married for 6 months. Henry and Anne became very good friends and she was given the title "The King's Sister". She outlived him by a decade.

Katherine Howard - Wife 5

Katherine Howard (Kitty) was just a teenager when she married the by now rather large, unhealthy, middle-aged Henry VIII in 1540. Impressed by her youth and beauty, he called her "the rose without a thorn". (Heaven knows what she saw in him, apart from the fact he was king!)

Kitty was secretly in love with another man, Thomas Culpepper. Henry found out, and in a fit of jealousy, he had her beheaded. She said "I die a queen, but I would rather die the wife of Culpepper". She was just 21.

Catherine Parr - Wife 6

Catherine Parr had already been widowed twice when she married Henry VIII in 1543. She was a pretty sensible sort of woman and tried to make a good, close home for his three children, who all had different mothers. Henry VIII really trusted her and when he had to go to war in France, he let her rule England in his absence. She was still his wife when he died in 1547, although she herself died in 1548 aged 36.

BIRTH AND DEATH DATES

We do not know the exact date of birth for all the wives as people did not keep very good records then. We do know the years, however.

Catherine of Aragon: 16.12.1485 - 07.01.1536

Anne Boleyn: 1501 - 19.05.1536

Jane Seymour: 1508 - 24.10.1537

Anne of Cleves: 22.09.15 - 16.07.1557

Katherine Howard: 1521 - 13.02.1542

Catherine Parr: 1512 - 07.09.1548

Henry VIII:

His hobbies included jousting, hunting, listening to music, dancing, feasting, wrestling and gambling.

He was quite a good musician.

Henry had a hunting accident in 1544 when a horse rolled on his leg. It never really healed properly and he had an ulcer (like a smelly, leaky wound that never gets better) on his leg forever after that. It hurt too much for him to take exercise, but he still ate and drank loads, which is probably why he became so large - 54" or a huge 137cm round the waist!

Henry was very charming.

Henry never expected to be King. He was the younger brother of Prince Arthur. He only became King because Arthur died. This made him determined to be the best King he could, to prove that he was worth it.

He was well educated and had a library of nearly 1000 books - a vast amount for that time.

Henry VIII did not think much of his father Henry VII, and completely changed most of his laws and policies when he became King.

Henry was very energetic and when hunting would tire out 8 horses in a single day!

Henry was handsome as a young man and that made him vain - he was convinced that he could make any woman love him, even after he got fat and old. (He couldn't believe it when Anne of Cleves didn't like him!)

Some people felt that Henry never grew up and it was like dealing with a big, spoilt baby.

Henry was one of those people who just HAD to be right all the time - he did not like being challenged! He was scared of being made a fool of.

Henry could be very spiteful - just think how he had Kitty Howard killed because she was in love with someone else. After he invented the Church of England, he ordered all the monasteries to be dissolved, and in fact his soldiers blew a lot of them up. This is a great shame because they were very beautiful.

Henry VIII was the second son of Henry VII and his wife Elizabeth Woodville.
