Dear Parents / Carers.

Despite the ups and downs presented by COVID this half term has ended well. There has been plenty of exciting learning taking place, from children enjoying PE lessons supported by our new PE curriculum and PE facilitators to a monster ball and an Egyptian tomb.

The school are currently quickly developing plans to address issues relating to lunch provision. On our return to school after the October break we will be returning to a full hot menu for the winter. Some parents have flagged issues with some of the portion size of some of the Deli menu days, which we have been keen to address at the earliest opportunity.

We do know that food waste increases on the hot meal days, but we also know that many parents are keen to know that their children are eating a hot meal and more vegetables at school. It is therefore important that we work in partnership with you to encourage all children to eat their meals and try vegetables etc. We have talked in the recent Harvest assembly about the environmental cost of food waste and will continue to educate children about the importance to their health too. We would be grateful if parents can also continue to reinforce these important messages at home.

> The return to full hot menus presents some difficulties. As you know from our previous correspondence on this topic, serving hot meals in classrooms is problematic. Transporting plated meals, dealings with clearing waste and dirty plates/cutlery from multiple classrooms around the

school is logistically challenging and impractical. We therefore opted for the hot boxes for Years 3 to 6 to overcome this issue. However, the boxes carry quite a hefty cost, which we have only been able to manage not to pass that cost onto parents by balancing the meals with the Deli bags. If we abandon the Deli bags the costs of meals will have to increase. Given the economic climate we are keen to avoid passing extra expense onto our families.

A solution would be to have all children return to the hall to eat their meals. However, we are concerned that we are not able to seat the school in the hall, even with staggered lunch times. This is because we need to maintain the tight hygiene regime of thoroughly cleaning chairs and tables between each sitting. Our pupil numbers have grown in the last few years which also means that the lunch window is not long enough to accommodate the multiple seating times needed. We are also conscious that we do not want to mix year groups on mass in the hall given the precarious COVID situation. Therefore, another solution is needed.

We have decided to develop another serving station in Upper Key Stage 2 for school meals. To do this we will need to purchase a new hotplate serving station so meals can be transported, along with equipment to allow us to centrally gather waste and dirty plates away from the hall. We are hopeful this will overcome the barriers we have described and allow us to return to the normal, plated meals many of you want for your children. This is not a quick solution. Therefore, for first 3 weeks we will move to full hot meals but serve in hot boxes for Year 3 to 6, and in the hall on plates for Reception to Year 2. The school will absorb the additional costs incurred temporarily until the new serving arrangement can begin.

With regard to wider COVID measures, the school will maintain pods for after half term and review fortnightly. Given the mass outbreaks in many other local schools, it is felt like we have a measure that can prevent mass disruption. 

If you do not get your applications by the deadline you will be less likely to be offered one of your preferred schools.

Families will need to submit their application through their home authority (who they pay their council tax to).

Don't let your child miss out on school milk after their 5th birthday

When your child turns 5, your child's supply of free milk finishes. However, if you would like to pay for your child to receive milk we have made arrangements with Cool Milk to supply milk at a subsidised cost.

What you need to do:

Visit www.coolmilk.com as soon as possible and select "Register your child for milk here", then follow the onscreen instructions to register and pay.



If your child is registered for Free School Meals (i.e. NOT the Universal Free School Meals) the school can continue to supply your child with free milk. Please let the office know if you wish this to continue.
