

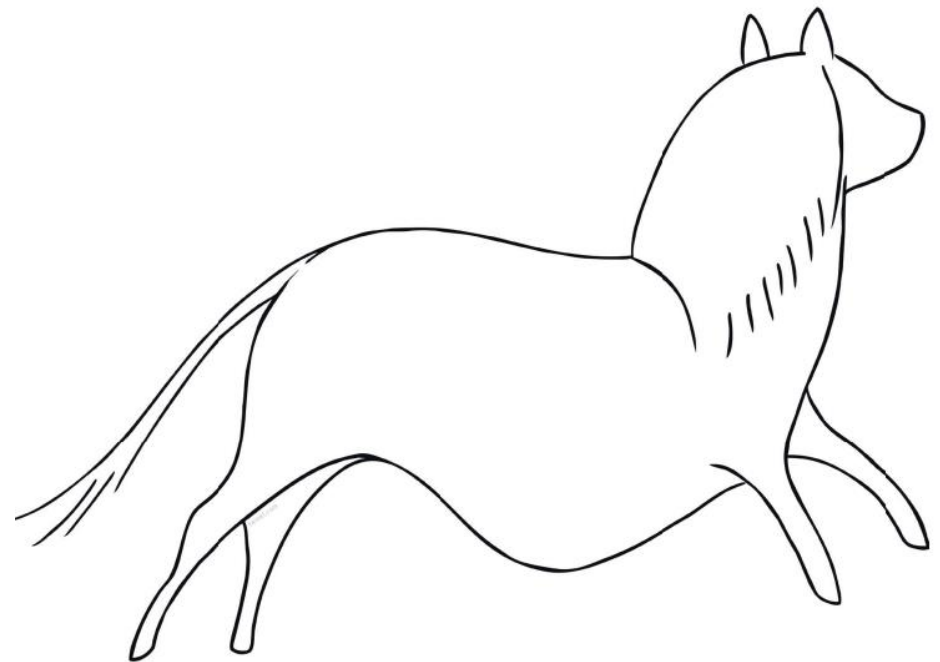
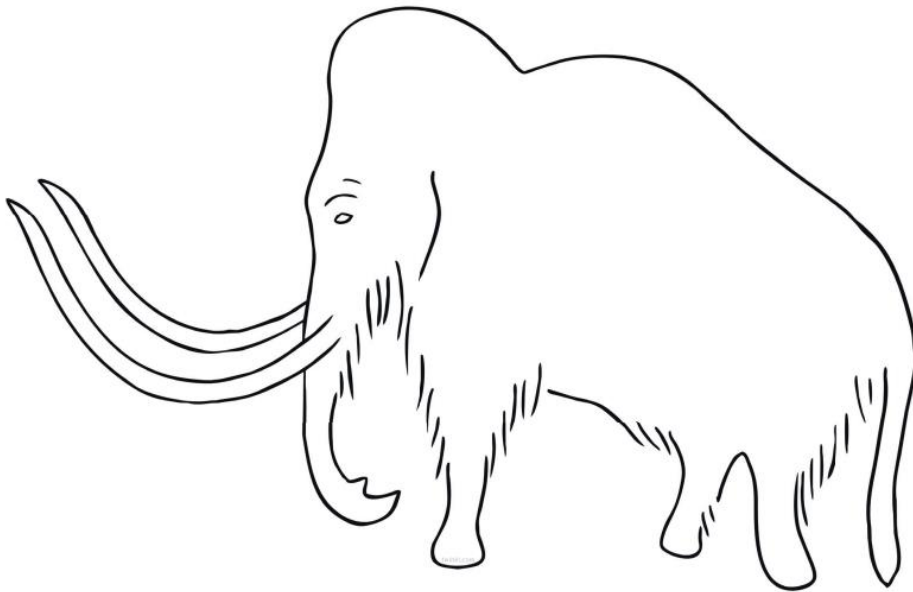
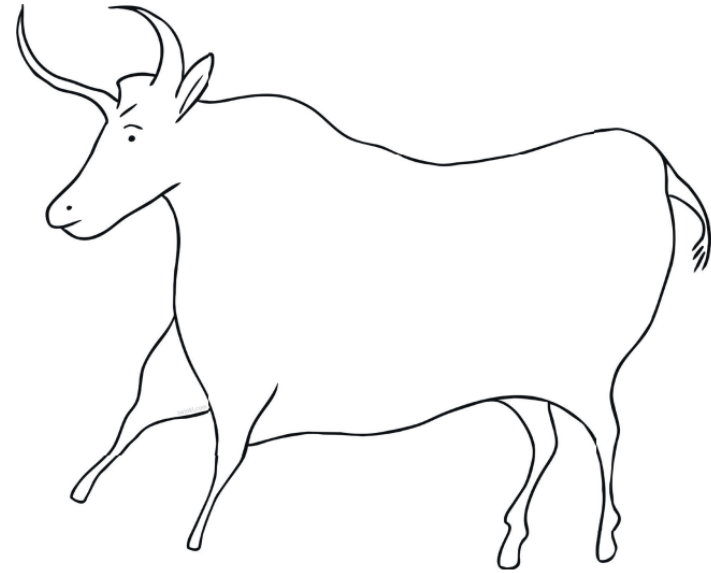
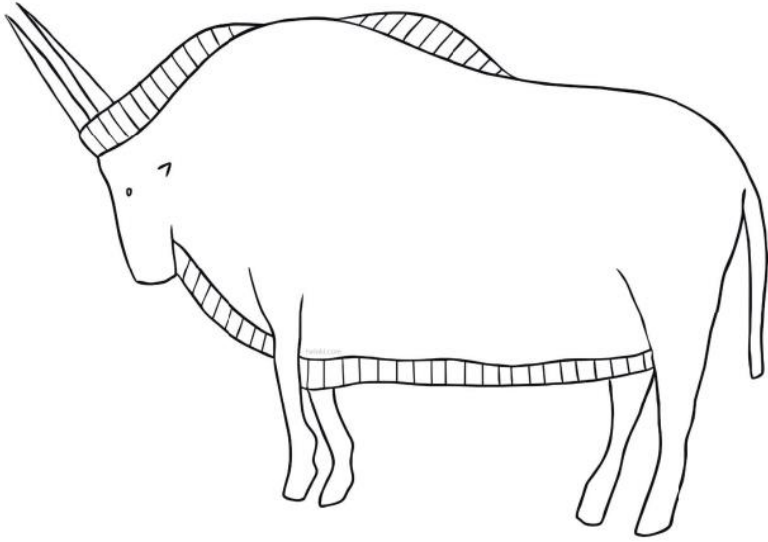




Year 3 Homework Menu - Autumn term

Most of the paintings are of animals and hunters and are thought to be a way that Stone age people communicated. They used natural pigments which are red, brown, black and white. Use these colours to produce your own cave paintings. You can use the animal outlines attached below to help you, or research images online.</p>	<p><u>Topic</u> Research the sort of food that people in the Stone Age ate. They would have gathered berries and other naturally growing food. They would have also hunted and killed animals for meat. Once you have a list for foods that would have been available, create a menu for a Stone Age family. Think about how you can make it sound delicious!</p>

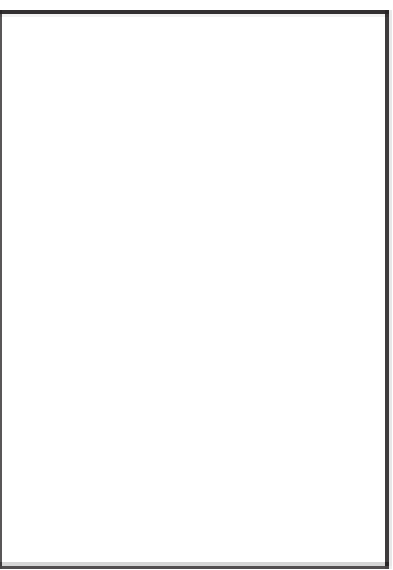
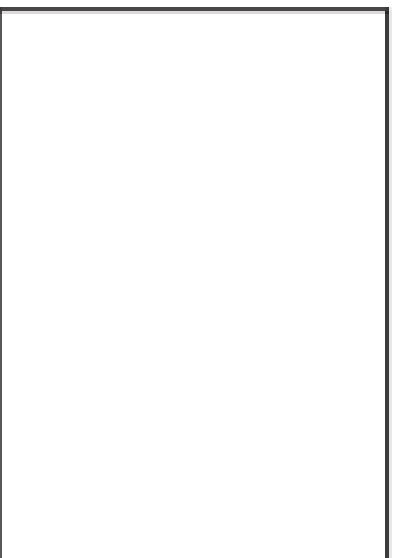
In the two pictures below, the arrows represent forces acting. Write the names of the forces in the boxes.
